From a bird's-eye view, the following scene must look somewhat peculiar: Several boats bobbing on small waves of a lake. Around each boat, a swimmer occasionally bursts out of the water on cue to splash the boat's crew with a refreshing shower.

This is one of our many workshops on public speaking. Many people are not aware that we all have a voice that we can vary and is one of our most powerful tools. In several sessions, the participants learn about breathing techniques and how to use their whole body when speaking and singing. And what does the water fight have to do with voice training? It's simple: all participants are given a topic on which they must spontaneously deliver a short speech. While doing so, they must maintain their balance standing in a rocking boat, try not to speak nonsense, and ensure that their voice reaches the other boats that are about 60 meters away. If not, the distant listeners shout "Splash!" and the swimmers act upon this request with visible pleasure.

and bring them to Kerala, to the kanthari campus. They come from Angola, Bolivia, Cameroon, The Democratic Republic of Congo, India, Indonesia, Kenya, Malawi, Nepal, Nigeria, Uganda and Zimbabwe. Several participants already have started organisations, others only have an idea so far. But all of them come with interesting life experiences.

For the first time, this year we have practicing lawyers, social workers and psychologists who deal with juvenile delinguency, we have two participants from countries that are completely new to us, from the Democratic Republic of Congo and from Angola. They provide us with new information about regions that are unfamiliar to us, and for the first time we have two participants with severe hearing impairments, for whom we have had to adapt our learning methods. One of the many adaptations is the need to speak loudly and clearly, otherwise it's "Splash!"

Online Graduation Ceremony In May, we celebrated the successful launch of 21 organizations from the last kanthari generation. In short speeches, they talked about challenges but also about successes already achieved. Here are some insights that were shared by some of the fresh kanthari graduates of the 2023 batch:

Nelson Kamoyo - <u>Thanzi265</u> -Malawi (2023)

Thanzi265 is a Malawian organisation which works on the wellbeing of children and women to break the cycle of malnutrition and poverty through food literacy and promoting sustainable farming practices. One tool is a mobile kitchen

On the 12th of April we organized a village cleanup drive with our Nourishing Minds Pilot project beneficiaries. 18 children participated (of which 12 are school dropouts). Our focus was to collect discarded plastic bottles around Kuchata Village in Lilongwe rural. The result was a cleaner village, and it provided a valuable learning opportunity for the children. The collected plastic bottles were repurposed for a lesson on drip irrigation, offering a sustainable water source for the seeds of newly planted trees around the building that was donated to us.

Mary Mutua - <u>Twajali</u> -Kenya (2023)

At Twajali we equip marginalized youth from the slums with tools and skills, so they get opportunities in the hospitality industry. During the past three months, we closed our center in Nairobi, as we focused on relocation before we start the September intake. Despite the closure, we remained active in various ways: Our apprenticeship program, which took place on April 8, 2024, was successful with 100% internship placement for the 13 trainees of the outgoing batch. Recently, we participated in a meeting organized by the Caritas group in Machakos town. The focus was on combating drug use among youth, and our course re-





ceived significant interest. And, in May we were able to acquire a piece of land where we will build our new center.

Anubha Singhal – <u>EnableMe Access</u> (<u>EMA)</u> - India (2023)

Building capacities for an Inclusive society: EMA is a non-profit organization geared towards sensitizing, informing, and facilitating change for accessibility in the built environment and Universal Design principles. In the past three months, we have been working on the development of a software tool that will transform accessibility education and assessments in India. Additionally, we conducted training programs with diverse groups, from NGOs to real estate companies. The enthusiastic response from participants is a testament to the power of education. Many were surprised by the importance of universal design features and look forward to identifying gaps and finding solutions to their existing infrastructure."

Mutongi Kawara - <u>Mukundi</u> -Zimbabwe (2023)

Mukundi offers Holistic support for orphans affected by HIV/AIDS in Zimbabwe. Over the past couple of months we worked on our plant germination camp pilot project. The participants gained knowledge about plants and engaged in different hands-on activities such as planting and managing their own small vegetable garden.

We received clearance to operate in

Murewa district. We have successfully implemented our winter drive project where we were making donations of crotched socks to our beneficiaries in their households. This interaction enabled us to begin the selection of participants for health themed camp that scheduled for this coming August.
